Celebrating 25 Years of Cicada Place: A Legacy of Support & Transformation for Youth

On May 1st, 1999, Cicada Place opened its doors to offer a unique supported housing program for youth ages 16-22. Developed to meet the needs of Nelson's youth, Cicada Place was the first purpose-built youth-specific building in British Columbia. Cicada Place has been recognized both provincially and nationally as a best practice in serving youth.

Since opening, approximately 250 youth have called Cicada Place home. Stays have ranged from a couple of months to three or more years; however, the average stay has been sixteen months. With the growing shortage of affordable housing, we are finding youth staying longer as they face the challenges of transitioning into the community.

In Chinese folklore, a cicada symbolizes "rebirth." Cicada Place was built on the property that once housed the Chinese Union Hall. Many youth are seeking rebirth or a second chance on their journey to independence. Youth have made incredible transformations while living at Cicada Place and have gone on to achieve their life goals of becoming teachers, tradespersons, clinical counsellors, parents, hair stylists, business owners, and more.

Paramount to our program's success has been creating an environment where our residents feel safe and supported while they grow and develop into the adults they want to be.

Words & Reflections from Cicada Youth



Expanding Support for Survivors: Sexual Assault Services Launches in Nelson & Nakusp

This year saw the dream of having more fulsome services for those who experience sexual assault come to fruition. After several years of grant funding, an opportunity for permanent funding through the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General was successful through procurement. What was previously the Nelson Sexual Assault Response Team (NSART) was replaced by our new permanent Sexual Assault Services (SAS) Program, which launched in the late summer of 2023 and has a geographical catchment area of Nelson and Nakusp.

The SAS program aims to provide vital support and counseling services to survivors of sexual assault in the Nelson and Nakusp areas. It also allows for increased Community-Based Victim Services (CBVS) hours through a subcontract we provide to Nelson CARES (Advocacy Centre). In the future, the third facet of the funding will provide in-person support to survivors who present at Kootenay Lake Hospital. Program staff was hired in August 2023 to continue our commitment to fostering a safe and supportive environment for all individuals affected by sexual violence.

Since the funding announcement, we have made significant strides in developing our SAS program...

Our Program Coordinator and Crisis Counselor have been actively networking with community partners and service providers to enhance program visibility and recognition of this new service. As part of her efforts, we have also undergone a rebranding process, creating new promotional materials that highlight the services offered. These materials have been shared with targeted locations in the community to ensure that information reaches those who may benefit from our program.

Our SAS Coordinator has worked diligently with various local organizations and community partners to ensure our services remain inclusive and accessible. That hard work has shown itself through increased referrals to the program over time.

A commitment to collaborative relationships remains a key component of this program. As such, the SAS program dovetails well with NCS's existing Stopping the Violence Program (STV), Women's Outreach, and Aimee Beaulieu Transition House (ABTH). The latter (ABTH) holds the 24/7 Anti-violence Crisis line and whose staff are trained and skilled in responding to disclosures of sexual assault. SAS staff is part of the Nelson Violence Against Women in Relationships Committee (VAWIR) and Safe Kids and Youth (SKY).

With support from The Ending Violence Association of BC (EVA BC), SAS took on a lead role in supporting a training initiated by the Nelson VAWIR Committee. That training saw an estimated fifty attendees (School administration, counsellors, police, Support Workers, and Victim Services from across the tri-city area) come together for training on Third-Party Reporting and Responding to Disclosures of sexual assault.

We couldn't be more pleased to include SAS in our portfolio of services for those who experience violence. Special thanks to Cheryl Smith, SAS Coordinator and Crisis Counsellor, for all her work in this program during this period.





New Supported Rent Supplement Program Rolls Out in Nelson

This Spring marked the rollout of the Supported Rent Supplement Program (SRSP) at Nelson Community Services - a collaborative project with BC Housing, Nelson Community Services, Mental Health and Substance Use, Interior Health, and the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction.

The Supported Rent Supplement Program has seen a slow and steady program rollout, along with developing the Coordinated Access for Supportive Housing table in Nelson. This table comprises service providers from numerous nonprofit organizations in our community and Ministry and Interior Health service workers.

The program aims to serve marginalized individuals who are currently experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness with uniquely tailored connections to mental and physical health services as well as cultural, social, and financial support to engage in secure housing in the private market.



Supported Rent Supplement Program Successes

In our first six months of running, our program has supported two clients in precarious housing through our rental supplement distribution. Receiving the subsidy allowed them to focus on their health needs with the security of knowing their housing was no longer in jeopardy.

In the last month, we have also secured housing for two individuals who have been experiencing chronic homelessness in our community. One individual, having been evicted from their home in the fall of last year, has been living outdoors since that time, and the second individual has experienced homelessness for nearly a decade. Both are set to move into their new homes for the month of October.

Supports Offered

For the last six months, we have had the opportunity to provide our clients with landlord mediation, to support open communication between landlord and tenant, assist in creating tenant profiles, support clients in the housing search, build personalized scripts to respond to rental opportunities and provide reliable transportation to view potential properties.

Along with housing support, our clients have been accessing life skills building, including technology support, time and budget management, engagement in healthy dialogue through boundaries and communication practices, warm referrals to numerous community resources, assistance in booking and accompanying appointments, and much more. We are excited to see where the next six months take us!

The management team at NCS is so proud to announce that Darshan, NCS Family Support Worker, received the Rising Star Award from the Community Social Services Employers Association of BC (CSSEA) this year. At the CSSEA Annual Conference held in Vancouver in October, Darshan was formally presented with his award, with his lovely partner and son present along with our Program Director/Acting Executive Director Joyce Dahms-Whiffen. As a soon-to-be father, Darshan Nickolchuk came to NCS as a young 16-year-old seeking housing and support. Thirteen years later, after a series of heartbreaking personal losses, his life came full circle when he returned to the agency as a practicum student. Darshan's ability to triumph over life's adversities primed him for a career in social services, as he demonstrated a natural ability to connect with individuals, be they youth in distress, women fleeing violence, or homeless individuals. Darshan approaches individuals with authenticity and kindness, using his warmth to forge relationships with community, colleagues, and other agencies. His willingness to help, whether it involves moving furniture or providing vacation coverage, has not gone unnoticed amongst his colleagues and is why the management team simultaneously and unanimously decided to submit his name as this year's Rising Star.
